

## **Human Nature Project**

“The Lottery” and *Lord of the Flies* deal a great deal with human nature, and whether we’re all naturally “savage.” Over the next few weeks we’ll discuss a great deal about what the authors believe, and whether we ourselves believe humans are naturally good or “bad.”

In this project, your group’s job is to create a “visual essay” examining and arguing both sides of the question: Are humans “good” or “evil”? Make a collage of “evidence” that shows that “humans are savage” and “evidence” that shows “humans are good.” It should be a collage of words, headlines, whole articles and pictures. Most of you will probably do two halves: one half “good” and the other “bad,” but you don’t need to do it that way. Be creative.

Your goal is two-fold:

- 1) The “good” side of your collage should start to convince the viewer that most people are naturally benevolent and kind-hearted—often putting others over themselves.
- 2) The “bad” side of your collage should start to convince the viewer that most people are naturally selfish and malicious—putting others in harm’s way to satisfy themselves/their quest for power.

Showing *only* the extremes of each won’t convince the viewer. Make sure you have “everyday evidence,” the kind that proves to us that on a daily level, people are naturally selfish or benevolent.

It’s going to be worth at least 15-20% of your grade for the trimester, so please make sure you work hard on it! As always, you will receive a group grade, and *you* will apportion those points among yourselves.
